Transitional licence applications are open

As a financial adviser, do you intend to get a financial advice provider licence for your business, or operate under someone else's licence? Consider your options.

Transitional licence applications opened on 25 November 2019. By 29 June 2020, anyone who gives financial advice must have their own, or be engaged by a financial advice provider with a transitional licence issued by the FMA. This means that you have time to get your structure right before you apply. You may find it useful to talk to a compliance consultant or lawyer about your structure first.

Remember that the financial advice provider must have an FSP number and register on the FSPR as a financial advice provider, as well as each financial adviser having their own FSP

number and registration. If you have previously been relying on the sole adviser exemption, and intend to register your business as a financial advice provider in the new financial advice regime and operate in a similar way, your business may be exempt from the levy that normally applies at initial registration – see <u>FSPR website</u> for more information.

To apply for a transitional license, (1) start by registering your intention on the <u>FSPR</u> website, and then (2) applying for your licence on the <u>FMA website</u>.

MBIE fact sheets

The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) released two more useful fact sheets about the new regime – one about financial advisers who are engaged by more than one financial advice provider, and the other about interposed persons. The previous fact sheets they released were about liability, and enforcement. The fact sheets are <u>available</u> here.
